The celebration will be six miles from Tucson on the 19th and the excursion tickets are good to the 26th. There will be a great variety of sports including a baseball game between the Bisbee and Tucson teams and a second game between the Phoenix team and the winner. There will also be footracing and dancing and a good time for all.

NEW CHEMICAL ARRIVES.—The new chemical engine purchased by the city arrived here yesterday and was set up in working order. It was made by the Anderson Coupling and Fire Supply company of Kansas City and weighs nearly two tons. It has two copper tanks holding sixty gallons each, two hand apparatuses and 200 feet of chemical hose. It has brass mountings and is painted red. This is a very efficient appearing machine for fire fighting. In the event of one tank being exhausted, it may be filled while the other is in service. Two large glass tubes contain the sulphuric acid which is dumped into the water charged with soda, by a wheel in the mechanism and in an instant almost a heavy pressure is obtained which throws the mixture with considerable force. There are two extra tubes or
