She is currently co-president of Eye Lounge gallery in Phoenix.

DeGideo started the series *Along the Way,* in order to remind herself to take the time to make art even though she is a busy mom and working professional. She takes her camera everywhere and is always on the lookout for an opportunity to catch a good shot wherever she might be located. Because she shoots with film, DeGideo doesn't always know exactly how the images will turn out until she develops them. She tries to embrace this loss of control as another reminder to appreciate every little moment and every good image. DeGideo says the series "has become a visual journey of the still, peaceful, surreal seconds that exist between the disarray, the grind and the busyness."

## Paige Reesor, Tempe
